


#### Important Terminology


- "In-service" means a licensed individual who is employed by a school district or accredited nonpublic school as a teacher.
- "Pre-service" means an individual who is receiving the education and training to become a licensed teacher but is not yet licensed.
- "Science of reading" means the teaching of reading using evidence-based research that includes phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary and comprehension.
- "Structured literacy" means the application of knowledge from the science of reading that teaches reading in an evidence-based and systematic way.

#### Blueprint for Literacy – SB 438

For many years, the Kansas Legislature has recognized the solid science behind early literacy success for children. It requires:

- Early screening of children (State Board Policy)
- Solid teacher (re)training in the science of reading and structured literacy
- Classroom materials that support evidencebased practices – NOT 3 cueing





### Blueprint for Literacy – SB 438

Creates the essential framework for an innovative and inclusive approach to assure accountability:

- Higher education institutions
- State Board of Education
- Education advocates
- School district board members
- School district administrators
- Classroom teachers, SPED teachers, paras
- Parents

- Director of Literacy Education (Dr. Cindy Lane was appointed by KBOR)
- Formation of the Literacy Advisory

  Committee first meeting was yesterday
  - 15 voting members
  - Determine micro-credential pathways\*
  - Fund in-service teacher credit tuition\*
- Formation of six regional Centers for Excellence in Reading
  - provide assessment and diagnosis of reading difficulties
  - train in-service and pre-service educators with simulation labs
  - support the professional learning of school-based instructional coaches
- Designate best practices for literacy training

## Cont. Responsibilities of the Literacy Advisory Committee

- Monitor progress of literacy training\* for in-service and pre-service teachers and literacy education of elementary and secondary students
- 100% of the Kansas special education, English for speakers of other languages and elementary teacher workforce achieve a micro-credential in the science of reading and structured literacy by 2030
- At least 50% of students in each of the grades three through eight achieving level 3 or above and at least 90% of students in each of the grades three through eight achieving level 2 or above on the English language arts state assessment by 2033
- Report progress 3 times a year to the Legislature
- Make recommendations\* to the state board of education, the state board of regents and the postsecondary educational institution presidents or chancellors
